



Trash Talk

On a visit to Edmonton EcoPark, Andrew Shields joins fellow BARA members to find out why effective waste management is more than a load of old rubbish.

The last place one might expect to find a fashion marketing and PR graduate is a grimy waste management site just off the North Circular. However, Deanna Donaldson, Communications and Engagement Manager at London Energy, has a compelling story to tell. It may lack glitz and glamour but it's central to the lives of more than two million Londoners.

London Energy is wholly owned by the North London Waste Authority (NLWA) and is contracted to provide waste management services to seven boroughs, including Waltham Forest. It's the second largest waste contract in the UK, handling and treating almost 850,000 tonnes of waste every year.

Edmonton EcoPark has been at the heart of this tale for almost half a century. Since Britain's largest incinerator was first fired up in 1971, more than 21 million tonnes of residual 'black bag' waste have been diverted from landfill and converted into electricity and other products such as road construction aggregate.

Burning issues

Incineration is not without its critics, who cite increased emissions and public health impacts. Greenpeace protesters scaled the site's iconic chimney in 2000, closing operations for four days, while Friends of the Earth and Londoners Against Incineration have also expressed concerns. Yet the statistics quoted by Deanna

are compelling: power to more than 80,000 homes is generated from the non-recyclable waste produced by residents in Barnet, Camden, Enfield, Hackney, Haringey, Islington and Waltham Forest. Rather than disposing of this waste in landfill, 'waste-to-energy' saves nearly 300,000 tonnes of CO2e every year. The figure for waste that is sent to landfill now fluctuates from just seven to ten per cent.

In addition, the seven councils in the NLWA receive a percentage of income according to the quantity of waste processed by the 230 operatives on site. Seven days a week, a constant stream of borough refuse lorries crosses the weighbridge before unloading into one of five vast bunkers. Vehicles must be in and out within 20 minutes and the waste must be burned within 72 hours.

Operations are monitored from the control room, barely changed since the 1970s and

containing ten huge screens and an array of quietly humming equipment like something out of a James Bond movie. The age of the site has limited the potential for automation, which is part of the reason why the current facility is set to be replaced.

Earlier this year, construction started on the North London Heat and Power Project (NLH-PP), which will deliver a replacement Energy Recovery Facility (ERF) to be operational by 2025. The ERF will generate low-carbon energy in the form of both heat and power, with a greater efficiency than the current plant.

Seventy-eight megawatts of power will supply electricity and heat for up to 127,000 homes. Industry-leading technology known as selective catalytic reduction will remove nitrogen oxide from emissions, supporting a

commitment to improved air quality. And savings in CO2e will be the equivalent of taking 60,000 cars off the road. Other improvements in the management of waste onsite will include a reuse and recycling centre open to the public, while a new visitor and education centre will be located on the banks of the River Lee Navigation.

Taking responsibility

The consequence of our increasing demand for convenience, and the packaging it generates, is that the weight of rubbish collected in the NLWA area is increasing at approximately three per cent per year. Waltham Forest is a signatory to the North London Joint Waste Strategy, which sets out the targets for reducing, reusing and recovering a greater proportion of the waste generated in the seven bor-

The strategy states an ambition for a 50 per cent recycling rate by 2020 but this can only be achieved, says Deanna, through education: "People want to be responsible and try to do the right thing in terms of recycling but we all simply have to focus on what we are buying in order to reduce our total waste burden.

Next time you're stuck behind the council refuse vehicle making its house-to-house collections around Bushwood, just pause for a moment. It's not waste from 'someone else' that's being processed – it's yours and mine.

Busting myths and better recycling. Your questions answered by the experts

Recycling is notoriously confusing for residents. In an effort to clarify best practice and dispel myths we posed your questions to Miriam Cragg, Senior Communications Officer for North London Waste Authority.

How much should we prepare our recycled waste, does it have to be washed?

Recycling doesn't need to be spotlessly clean. The important thing is that leftover food or liquid do not spread onto other items - this is especially problematic for paper and card. So most items, like soup tins or milk bottles, only need a quick rinse, whereas something like a chocolate spread jar may need a slightly more thorough clean, or it can go in the dishwasher.

Do lids have to be removed?

No, but it does help us because it makes it easier to compact them.

What happens to greasy items?

Heavily greasy cardboard/paper cannot go in the recycling bin. The grease will repel the paper fibres when it's being processed into new paper/card, creating holes. Other items (e.g. plastic pots or jars) just mustn't be so greasy that oil could leak onto other items – if they are just a bit greasy to touch, it's not a problem.

What should we do with compostable plas-

Compostable or biodegradable plastics cannot go in the mixed recycling or garden waste. For now, compostable plastics should be disposed of in the general waste bin or your own com-

Can we recycle pringle cans?

No, they are made up of a combination of metal and plastic which is difficult to separate. There are now special schemes in place to recycle them, run by Terracycle. Visit https:// www.terracycle.com/en-GB/brigades for more details.

Can we put loose paper in the green bin?

Yes that's fine. It gets separated mechanically at the materials recovery facility (MRF).

Do black plastic trays go in the green bin? No, we are currently still developing the tech-

nology to recycle them so for now, they are being burned for energy and must go in the black bin. The best option is to avoid black plastic trays where possible.

Can we put pizza boxes in for recycling?

As long as a pizza box isn't very greasy or contaminated with food, it's fine to go in the recycling.

Can we recycle plant pots?

No becuase the plastic used can't be used to make anything else yet. Nobody has a process that can use it. Some garden centres will take back previously used plant pots for re-use. Put in black bin or take to charity shop.

What's the best thing to do with shredded

paper?
Please put your shredded paper in the recycling but put it in a paper envelope before putting it in the green bin. This is so that it doesn't blow around everywhere when picked up.

Do we have to completely remove film lids?

Tiny bits of plastic film still attached won't be a problem. For example, sometimes little bits of the plastic film under the lid of a plastic milk bottle may remain attached and this is fine.

Are unwashed meat trays okay to recycle?

For hygiene reasons, it's good if they are washed out. This is especially because members of staff have to sort through the recycling to pull out contamination.

What items that end up in the green bin cause the biggest contamination problem? Crisp packets

Thin plastic film e.g. chocolate bar wrappers Black plastic containers

Polystyrene

Nappies

Tissues/napkins

Food waste

10 THINGS YOU CAN DO RIGHT NOW

There are many ways we can help to create less waste. The BT has sifted through all the ideas and found the simplest and most effective ways a Bushwood resident can make a difference right now. It takes time to change habits but the small things are a good place to start.

BUY YOUR SHOPPING IN BULK OR FROM A

Buying in bulk or from a package free shop can help reduce waste. Forest Gate's Cups & Jars is not only a cafe but you can also buy various groceries from dispensers. Take your old jars or use the donated ones. Conveniently its only 50 yards from Wanstead Park station 108 Woodgrange Rd

DON'T WASTE ENERGY

A few simple changes could save how much energy you use. Don't overfill the kettle or your saucepans. Don't underfill the oven, washing machine and dishwasher. Turning your thermostat down by 1 degree could cut your heating bills by 10%. Switch off lights and don't leave computers and TVs on Standby.

COMPOST YOUR OWN WASTE

The best way to get rid of food waste and compostable items is to have your own composter. Over the course of the year you can chuck all kinds of things in from compostible packaging and paper to garden waste. When you're getting your garden ready in Spring you'll have your own supply of beautiful compost saving you a trip to the shops to buy a plastic bag of it.

USE THE PAINT RECYCLING SHOP

Of the 320 million litres of paint sold in the UK an estimaged 50 million litres goes to waste. Reclaiming paint is good for the environment but also a cost effective way to decorate. If you have paint to donate you can take it the recycling center and if you want paint you can pick it up at:

Bright Sparks in Leyton is another Re-Use and repair shop where you can get cleaned and repaired items.

SECONTING A

USE YOUR RECYCLING CENTRES

We use to know them as 'the tip' and we'd have to help our dad dump the asbestos roof from the shed in a big container destined for landfill. Nowadays they're main function is to recycle rather than bury. If you've not been to one recently you might be surprised at how clean and organised they are. Here you can take almost anything and it will have a specific home. It can be a cathartic experience separating all your rubbish knowing its going to be reused. Textiles, shoes, paint, batteries and oil. Nearly everything can be reused. The nearest recycling centre is in Leyton near Asda and is open every day apart from Monday. GET YOUR DETERGENTS FROM STONE MINI MARKET

Leytonstone Mini Market has been stocking bulk detergents and other household products for months. You can bring your own bottle or they can supply you a donated recycled one. Products such as washing up liquid, toliet cleaner and fabric softener are availabe to buy per 100ml. They also do a number of other ethical products such as recycled toilet roll, They will be expanding into a new shop in the new year and will be trialing new ways to shop ethically with Our Pledge and also introducing lots of new environmentally friendly products.

TAKE YOUR OWN BOTTLE

Bottled water uses 17 million barrels of oil a year to produce. Its one of the most unneccesary uses of plastic we have. Although we can recycle the bottle it would be much better than to have never made it in the first place. Taking your own water bottle is not only better for the environment but better on your wallet

Single use plastic bags are down 90% since the introduction of the 10p charge but there are still times when you find yourself needing one. It's a good idea to keep a bag with you all the time and the foldable recycled bags are great. These bags are made from recycled plastic and fold into a small pouch. Alternatively carry one of our BARA tote bags with you.





Our high street is already getting involved and trying to do their bit to tackle climate change. Alex Maws talks to some of the business owners about what they're already doing to help.

In 2019, most people are now aware that tackling global climate change and pollution requires large corporations to significantly change their ways, but even small businesses have a role to play. I set out to ask a few local Leytonstone High Road favourites about what steps they are taking to reduce their environmental impact.

"One typical small business' waste is equivalent to an entire residential street," **Shah Ahmed**, proprietor of the **Star of India**, informed me, underscoring the responsibility that a business like his restaurant carries. In

recent years, with the rising popularity of online food delivery services, Shah has seen the majority of his business shift to takeaways, requiring significantly more plastic.

Uncomfortable with this fact, Shah recalled the custom that was popular when he was young of returning glass Coke bottles to be reused. This provided the inspiration for a new scheme in which Star of India customers are invited to return their takeaway containers to be sterilised and reused. The restaurant provides an incentive of 5p per container.

Shah reports that changing the habits of both his customers and delivery staff required a period of transition, but the scheme, still in its early stages is showing signs of promise and inspiring him to look at other areas where change is possible.

"We're all in it together; from producers down to the consumer," he says.

Adrienne Aslan from Stone Mini Market rattled off a list of ways that she has demonstrated that the humble off-licence corner shop

can act upon its values. "Over the past two years, we've been trying to phase out plastics and waste at our shop," she explains. "We offer liquid refills for washing up liquid, floor cleaner, laundry detergent and fabric softener. We are also phasing out big name brands whether in crisps or beers, as well as offering vegan options."

These efforts have been so successful that the shop will soon be moving to a larger premises a few doors down the High Road.

Adrienne was eager to tell me about her shop's involvement with a programme called Our Pledge - a crowd-funding platform headed by Bushwood resident Rachael Castell that helps businesses prove that there is a demand for the greener products. As part of a pilot scheme launching in October, Stone Mini Market will be asking customers to pre-order easy-to-refill products such as pasta, rice and cereal through a website, enabling the shop to provide these at a competitive price and with significantly less packaging waste. Wild Goose Bakery was established as a social enterprise from the outset. Its environmentally conscious ethos is literally built into the structure of the shop - their tables and breakfast bar are made from a local horse chestnut tree that was blown down in a storm.

Co-owner **Kirstin Kinloch-Steyn** is proud to point out that the shop is almost completely free of single-use plastics – this includes using only loose leaf teas to avoid plastic tea bags (we're looking at you, PG Tips and Twinings) and not selling any bottled water (the staff are actually enthusiastic and not at all put out if you ask to refill a water bottle). All of the shop's bags, straws and takeaway cutlery are made from plant starch.

Kirstin and her husband Vernon both eat a largely plant-based diet, which helps to explain why the shop sells so many delicious vegan options. Reducing our society's consumption of animal products is essential to reversing global climate change, and with options as delicious as those sold at Wild Goose, this is hardly a sacrifice.

Along with the new location of Stone Mini Market and local mainstay Nature's Choice on Church Lane, Wild Goose will soon return to selling bulk products that customers can buy in refillable containers by weight.

Contacting the Star of India, Stone Mini Market and Wild Goose left me pleasantly surprised by the proactive measures being taken locally. Readers who are aware of similar steps being taken by other businesses are encouraged to share this information on the BARA Facebook group. The more we can encourage these practices locally, the better.

Our Pledge

The aim of 'Our Pledge' is to promote positive environmental change by helping to finance businesses to help

in making that change by proving that there is a demand for greener products. The scheme works by paying in advance through crowd funding for eco-friendly products. In the pilot, that will be running at Stone Mini Market, you will contribute to a crowdfund to effectively prebuy groceries and cleaning products, beginning with dried food from refill stations. Once funded the money can be used to bulk buy eco friendly products at a good price and also gives the shop owners an idea of demand. You recieve an e-voucher that you can use to purchase the products in store and the value is deducted from the amount you originally pledged. You will also receive exclusive extra perks throughout the year which will include tasting sessions and discounts on 'green events' In the next few weeks the trial crowdfund will begin and you can sign up at the Our Pledge website and become a 'Plegend' by pledging your money for spending at the Mini Market.

In the new year when the scheme starts to roll out, businesses and customers can come to Our Pledge with their own campaign ideas. Our Pledge will be working to connect customers and businesses for positive environmental change. If you would like your local shop to start stocking locally sourced vegetables or bulk refill stations you can put your money down for the products in advance to give them the confidence to make the change.

Rachael says "I'm delighted to be running our first campaign for Stone Mini Market, a shop that is already well-known and loved within the community for their environmental awareness. By pledging, you'll not only be ensuring that you get the eco products that you want - with a discount - but you'll also become part of our pledgendary community which gives you ongoing access to tasters and eco events throughout the year!"



Putting their foot down

BARA committee members Doug and Katy share their accounts of a 'speed gun' exercise on the High Road with with the Met Police.

One of the unexpected outcomes of our big summer birthday bash was meeting DeeDee from the Met Police. Lots of people chatted with her throughout the day, but one thing that particularly interested me in our conversation was the Police's Community Roadwatch Speed Gun Initiative.

It's a chance for members of the public to accompany Police Officers in monitoring local traffic for speeding and other unsafe driving habits.

I've often talked about my concerns regarding road safety, particularly around the High Road, so I jumped at the chance to get involved. Having been offered a selection of dates, I found a day that worked and met with three Officers who issued me with a High Vis jacket and talked me through how to use the equipment. For the next hour, I stood on the corner of Michael Road and the High Road and managed

chael Road and the High Road, and managed to clock 33 cars exceeding the speed limit. Don't worry - this wasn't a case of vigilante justice - the people I captured on the Speed Gun will only have received a warning letter. Nonetheless, it's a powerful reminder to drivers and pedestrians alike just how often speed limits are ignored, and the risks that can bring. During my time with the Officers, it was clear

Having also met DeeDee at our big birthday bash, and being Chair of the SNT Ward Panel I was keen to be involved with the Community Roadwatch Speed Gun Initiative. Living on Harvey Road means I experience drivers speeding down the road in their hurry to avoid the High Road traffic despite the speed bumps.

I met up with three Officers from the Stratford team on a very hot July afternoon on Marshal Road which leads into the Asda Superstore over in Leyton. Having donned my High Viz jacket and been instructed on the use of the equipment I spent the next half hour clocking 15 out of 30 cars exceeding the speed limited. One driver came over to enquire what we were doing and whether he would receive a fine and points on his licence. He was advised that he would receive a warning letter and that he should pay attention to his speed in the future. We advised one family out walking that their speed was 5 miles per hour and a cyclist his speed was 15 miles per hour. It was an interesting experience and served to remind drivers and the general public about the risks of speeding. I am going to try and arrange another exercise in Harvey Road in the near future. 












BARA Member wins an OSCA!

The Hollywood film variety has an 'r' on the end of the title, but in cricket circles an OSCA is no less prized.

Every year, the UK's various county cricket boards recognise individuals for their voluntary service to clubs and leagues. Among this year's recipients of an Essex 'Outstanding Service to Cricket' award is BARA member Dilawar Patel, who received a 'Lifetime Achievement' award to mark more than 50 years' involvement in grassroots cricket.

Dilawar was aged just 19 when, in 1970, he founded Leytonstone Cricket Club (LCC). The club played matches at Leyton Cricket Ground (now the site of an exciting £1.7 million cricket hub created in conjunction with the England & Wales Cricket Board and Essex County Cricket Club) and in Lee Valley Park.

During the '70s and '80s, many children of the first wave of Asian-heritage players inherited their parents' love of the game and became involved, not only as players but as coaches and administrators - in the case of Dilawar's son Sajid, as founder of the National Cricket League which has become one of the largest Sunday leagues in the south-east. LCC, now known as East London Leytonstone & Frenford Cricket Club, continue to play in the Premier Division of the National Cricket League. In 1993, Dilawar was part of a group that founded another Sunday league, the Gujarati Metropolitan Cricket League. Twenty-six years on, he continues to serve that league as an umpire and organiser.

Many congratulations to Dilawar, we're sure his OSCA will have pride of place on the family mantelpiece! Meanwhile, both father and son continue to ensure cricket thrives in our community. London City Airport Consultation

Ever since London City Airport announced its plans to consult on a 'Masterplan' for the future of the airport, Bushwood residents have had concerns how they might be affected. When the airport previously secured planning permission to narrow the flight path over Bushwood and Leytonstone residents felt unhappy that City Airport failed to organise any events for them to find out more and raise their concerns and questions.

In September, these concerns had their chance to be voiced at a meeting at George Tomlinson School chaired by Rev David Britton. On one side, representatives for the for City Airport and on the other side HACAN (Heathrow Association for the Control of Aircraft Noise), a campaign group that represents residents under Heathrow flight path. Residents were given the chance to ask questions and find out more about the plans.

The representatives of City Airport began with a detailed presentation on their proposals and economic rationale which included local job creation, better services, more flights and a quicker path through the airport. They say traditional business flight numbers are declining and they want to increase their leisure flight capacity and their destinations. To do this they plan to end the 24hr ban on weekend flights and to start the flying day earlier and concluding it later. This will lead to a substantial increase in flight numbers and its argued that this will impact on Bushwood and Leytonstone at the take off stage.

John Stewart from HACAN followed and suggested some areas to challenge the plans particularly around noise and the impact on the climate.

Following this was a 60 minute Q&A of the representatives of London City Airport on their proposals. The BT observed that all questions and comments expressed didn't support the airport's proposals. The comments ranged from criticising the airports poor presentation of their data, concerns over noise and the impact on air quality on the ground and in the air and how it might negatively affect the quality of life in Bushwood and Levtonstone.

Any Garden, Any Tree

Trees are important and one of our greatest weapons against climate change. Garden designer, Mark Cummings suggests trees for even the smallest of gardens.

Trees capture carbon and release oxygen, prevent soil erosion and reduce rainwater run off from the surface of the ground. They're an invaluable asset in the city paved with gold.

I always try to plant at least one tree in the gardens I create. Trees provide shade on a sunny

day, shelter from the wind, a canopy to protect from the rain, and more food for our pollinators than a meadow. Further up the food chain our native birds can feast on the critters that inhabit the branches. They are also one of the most important scenic features that can be added to a garden.

But planting trees can be an emotive subject: Fears about property boundaries, shade, subsidence, size and maintenance all have to be considered. So, modify the mantra 'right plant right place' to 'right tree right place'. Regardless of the size, aspect and soil structure of a garden, there will be a tree that fits (no shoe horn required).

It is essential that selecting a tree should be a systematic and well-researched process. However, you will see evidence of poorly chosen trees in many gardens. Often this is because when a tree is bought from a nursery it is relatively small and it is difficult to visualize '15 meters by 10 meters in 10 years time'.

So what do you need to know?

On the whole, trees aren't fussy and it's easy to give them the start they need to thrive. They need staking, mulching and watering well in their first year. The stake, which should be low enough to prevent the root ball from rocking but not the top of the tree from swaying in the wind, can be removed after the second year. This actually encourages strengthening of the tree.

Selecting your tree

Do you want an evergreen, which holds on to its leaves all year or a deciduous tree, which drops its leaves in the winter but offers spring blossom and autumn colour. The next thing is to think about the size and shape of the tree you want and to consider foliage, blossom and fruit.

Fruit can be thought if as your productive apples, pears, plums and cherries or in the wider sense of whether your tree is male or female.

It is the female trees that bear fruit. Male trees do not

Once we have considered the above we need to start thinking about the actual tree we want. And this is the fun bit. Here is a list of trees that will work in any small London garden.

Crab apples (Malus) and ornamental cherries (Prunus) are deciduous with glorious spring blossom, autumn colour and fruits that last well through the winter, feeding our garden birds.

Malus Adirondack: White flowers in spring with two tone orange red fruit in autumn (*Height 4m x Spread 2.5m*)

Malus Mattfru: Large orange-red flushed fruit (*H5m x S3m*)

Malus toringo: White flowers in spring with red or yellow fruit in the autumn (*H3m* x S5m)

Prunus amanogawa: Narrow, fastigiate form (H8m x S4m)

Prunus autumnalis 'Rosea': flowers throughout the winter (H4m x S4m)

Prunus Prunnus incisa 'Kojo-no-mai': (suitable for a large pot on a sheltered but sunny balcony though will be as happy in the ground) (H2.5m x S2.5m)

The following trees also have a particular place in my gardens:

Sorbus villmorinii with spring blossom, vibrant red autumn colour and the winter berries make them a worthy addition to the smaller garden (H5m x S4m)

Acer psuedoplatanus 'Brilliantissimum' has the most amazing mottled salmon leaf colour in spring that return in the autumn (H5m x S6m)

Acer griseum otherwise know as the paper bark maple has flaking, cinnamon-brown bark - it catches the low sunlight in the winter and sets the tree on fire. It's stunning. Slightly larger than the rest but a slow grower (and worth the wait) (H8m x S8m)

But by far my favorite tree is *Amelanchier x grandiflora 'Ballerina'*. It is particularly exquisite from when its leaves unfurl like mini candelabras followed by the pure white blossom to the jet-black berries and then its fiery autumn crescendo. (H5m x S6m)

There is an old saying that the best time to plant a tree is twenty years ago. The second best time is now. What are you waiting for?


